Steep

I've always loved this word. I capture the waft of a thick, rich, slow-simmering stew when I think of it.

Others may think of something quite different. The word may conjure up for some a Cascade trail: an ever-rising incline of rugged trail.

This word comes to my mind right now because it provides a metaphor for these three months of June, July and August. One meaning of 'steep' according to the American Heritage Dictionary is "Ambitious; difficult; said of a goal or undertaking." As I think back over these three years we've spent together, I think it is fair to say that the work we've set about here at Fremont has been ambitious: a big closet cleaning and purge, a renovated game room, preparations for major renovations (and yes, they're still in the works), a two-year vision plan, expansion in our Outreach efforts, launching WaySide, establishing a sister relationship with First AME Zion. It has required a certain consistent pushing forward as in hiking a steep mountain trail. Now, do not misunderstand me. Do not think that I am describing nothing but an arduous, painful trail. By no means! Hiking is fun. Mountains are grand. And for any of us who have set out on a mountain trail, we know the rewards that come with the strained muscles—those trail turnings that open up to spectacular breath-stealing, awe-inspiring vistas that make one ever more eager to push forward and upward.

I think that's a fair description of these three years: good things have shown up in the turns and vistas. We've worked hard as a church. We've chosen the more demanding, steeper trail. We've pushed through a bit of thicket here and a little slippery clay there and we've come upon rewarding surprises and gratifying experiences. We're nowhere near the end of our trail and we are eager to push forward. What awaits us around that next bend?!

This brings me to the second sense of the word 'steep'. The word means "to soak in liquid in order to cleanse, soften, or extract some property from;" also "to infuse." Ever put your feet in a cold mountain stream after a long day of hiking; or taken a sauna after a day of skiing? Exertion calls for rest. Rest is necessary in order to restore one's energy *from* and *for* sustained exertion.

And sometimes, an hour in the tub is just not enough. Sometimes, one should consider a spa. Sometimes one needs a good low-simmered stew.

This word "steep" has special significance to us this summer. I will be linking my remaining 2016-17 vacation days with a one-month rest and renewal leave (a United Methodist Church clergy benefit). I will be away from June 15 through July 29. I've made provision for the Sunday services in my absence (something you'll read about further on in this newsletter) and for pastoral care with clergy colleagues (more info on that as well).

Some might be tempted to think such a leave at this time could jeopardize our momentum but I invite you to think of it as an important time for steeping.

It is true that I ask you to maintain faithful Sunday attendance and sustained activity here over June and July (while I steal away), I'm also hoping you will take this opportunity to steep. I hope you will quietly ponder what we've accomplished and consider what might lay ahead. Invite God to cook in your kitchen: to stir up a mixture of Spirit-filled ingredients that will simmer and steep and be made ready for another outing. This is what I'm going to be doing over those six weeks. I'm going to be resting, yes, but this rest will be a steeping rest. It will be a rest meant to "soak in, to cleanse and soften." It is a rest meant to "infuse" me with ingredients that I trust will enhance and guide my ministry with you.

I invite you to simmer and steep as I do the same. Be restful, mindful, and prayerful. And let's prepare ourselves for another good steep trek together come fall.

"A funny, moving, and true story of an ordinary boy with an extraordinary face that's perfect for fans of Wonder—now available in the U.S. When Robert Hoge was born, he had a tumor the size of a tennis ball in the middle of his face and short, twisted legs. Surgeons removed the tumor and made him a new nose from one of his toes. Amazingly, he survived—with a face that would never be the same. Strangers stared at him. Kids called him names, and adults could be cruel, too. Everybody seemed to agree that he was "ugly." But Robert refused to let his face define him. He played pranks, got into trouble, had adventures with his big family, and finally found a sport that was perfect for him to play. And Robert came face to face with the biggest decision of his life, he followed his heart. This poignant memoir about overcoming bullying and thriving with disabilities shows that what makes us "ugly" also makes us who we are."

GIVING COUNTS: An Important Word (or Two!) from the Finance Committee

We appreciate the faithfulness of our pledging families in making payments on their pledge. Right now, pledges received exceed 90% of the budgeted amount for the first four months of the year. We recognize that it can be easy to forget weekly or monthly payments in the summer, but we hope everyone can continue their payments with such faithfulness.

Pledged giving pays for 64% of our annual budget, which we rely on to meet our monthly expenditures for staff, program and building operations. Building use fees and rents pay for another 20% of budgeted expenses. We rely on our three fundraisers (basement sale, auction/funraisers/Christmas tree sale) to make up some of the difference, paying for at least 10% of the budgeted expenses.
