Upon Hearing My Korean Brothers and Sisters Pray*

A cacophony of vowels and consonants rising from the silence composing in emphatic union a symphony of appeal and praise.

Like a mountain stream: fed by trickles meeting with single purpose, tumbling over stones and gracing their heads while racing on with jubilant glee.

I dip my fingers into the cool, clear water. It pulls me in, submerging me, drenching me with that same grace. I swim in the music of their fervent voicing, the song of their love and passion and am carried to a vast ocean, a borderless basin of mystery which sweeps me up in a warm wash of a wind-and-water whirl casting me heavenward, then settling me gentle in the holy of holies filled to the brim with speechless praise.

I've had another experience with prayer where I've been similarly moved. At the conclusion of each of our Sacramental Living sessions, we pray for the person seated on our left. Who sits where varies each week so one never knows who one will be praying for week to week. Because these are spoken, not silent, prayers, folks were a bit shy at first, yet always eloquent, even in their hesitations. As the weeks have progressed these prayers have become freer and robust and impassioned and insightful and affirming and comforting. Each week gifts of intercession on behalf of the one seated on our left, have been lifted to heaven: a prayer to God, a gift to our friend. These prayers have helped us claim and enact what we've been discovering and experiencing, and they have led us to deeper fellowship.

The disciples had asked Jesus to teach them to pray and he did. He gave them the architecture of prayer and he modeled praying. One of the great treasures in our scriptures is what we call The High Priestly Prayer—the prayer recorded in the 17th chapter of the Gospel of John. Jesus prayed this powerful prayer of intercession just before he was arrested. There's a compelling juxtaposition here. Jesus knew he was about to shift the cosmic equation. He was going to overthrow death itself and all that is death-dealing. His prayer precedes this great reversal and it anticipates the glory it will inaugurate.

Lord, teach us to pray. In this, our time, when we feel surrounded by death, may we remember who we are in Christ. The Lord has taught us to pray, is teaching us to pray, is imploring us to pray. And whether our prayers are spoken in a symphonic cacophony or as a softly-spoken supplication for a friend, they are a refrain of Jesus' great prayer and they carry the same power to embody love and refute all that is death.

I in them, and You in Me that they may be perfected in unity, that the world may know that You did send Me and did love them even as You did love me. Iohn 17:23

Let us pray.

Pie Birds at Sunday Service

Worship service on April 8 will feature The Pie Birds!

What is the Christian Imagination? And what has it to do with race?

We have a unique and timely opportunity to dive really deep into why it is we have racial tensions. And why is it, Christians are as troubled by racial prejudices as non-Christians?

There's a very important work on this subject titled *The Christian Imagination, Theology and the Origins of Race* by Willie James Jennings. Jennings won a 2015 Louisville Grawemeyer Award in Religion as a new theological voice because of this book.

Brett Stuvland, a former student of Dr. Jennings, is coming to Fremont to lead us into the revelatory history and Christian theology Jennings writes about. Jennings reveals how the Christian faith was an immediate partner to contriving racial identity (and stratification) and how it theologized justifications for this classification of humanity; how far back this theological framework goes and how it has threaded its way forward to our day.

This study will augment and amplify Christena Cleveland's workshop of February 3 (whom Brett also knows) and help us reflect further on her remarks and her own book: *Disunity in Christ*.

Study begins April 12 and meets every Thursday at 7:00 pm through June 7. Please don't let the duration put you off. This is going to be worth it!

Bishop's Table Talk for the Way Forward

Bishop Elaine Stanovsky invites United Methodists to deep, worshipful conversations across the Greater NW Area on the topic of human sexuality in a church divided. The United Methodist is in some danger of splitting because we don't agree about human sexuality and we don't know how to live together with our differences.

We are searching to find a way forward that allows us to continue life-changing and life-saving ministries together at the same time that it allows space for people to minister according to their deepest held faith commitments.

We don't expect everyone to agree when they arrive, or when they leave, but we do hope that if you come you will feel genuinely heard, and that you will gain understanding and respect for other people in the church. And at the end of the day, you'll be able to say, "God is with us. God's at work in these conversations. We belong at one table that's prepared for us where we are fed by Jesus."
