## **Communing Across the Divide**

We love our individualism. We of the USofA hold it as a precious thing: the freedom be *self-*determined--to be able to pursue our interests and express our preferences without interference from others (so long as we don't interfere with them). And there's merit to this kind of freedom, to be sure. It certainly encourages creativity and innovation.

Individualistic self-determination is good yet so is collaborative community. These two things are in tension, though, and they are, in their extreme, mutually exclusive.

And when either is practiced in the extreme dark things emerge. Right now, we're in an extreme expression of individualism: identity politics we call it wherein we gravitate to people we perceive to be just like us—who affirm our rendition of what it means to be an individual, an individual in company with like individuals. Some might think this a good thing. Some might think this is collaborative community. It is not.

Collaborative community is an amalgam of diverse individuals who join together for a common goal. Individuals within such community effort must often subvert their own interests for the sake of the community. They must also embrace the company of people with whom they have little in common.

Our penchant for individualism has overshadowed our affection for collaboration with the result that we as a people are spinning in an ever-narrowing circle.

I believe the challenges we face as a society present an important opportunity for people of faith. The three great monotheistic religions: Judaism, Christianity, Islam call their adherents to community. Our God asks us to keep our private interests in check for the sake of the greater good. I believe these me-above-all times call us to rise to our full height as Christians and lead the way, set the tone, radiate a model of radical-yet-joyful cooperativeness, of true greater-good living.

To make this so, though, we are going to need to take the initiative and reach across the divides we see and seek fellowship with people with whom we disagree: people who hold a theology in conflict with ours, people who hold political views in conflict with ours, people who live in economic circumstances different from ours. I wish I could lay out a specific map for this, but I think it might be a matter of each of us lowering our filters, shelving our preconceptions and purposely seeking out fellowship with unlikely friends.

Some of you may already have done this. If so, I invite you to share your experience (whatever it was) with us all. We can make room in the newsletter for your story—what you learned, what we could learn from your experience. The adjustments you made to reach out might identify some we'd like to make as a congregation. Let's not do this in a private individualistic way, let's do it in a public communal way. It could yield a compelling dimension to what it means to live by faith—a full-height faith, other-embracing faith, greater-good yielding faith.
